Mitos (Myths)

Gabriela Lena Frank

Libertango, by the Argentinian "*neuvo tango*" innovator Astor Piazzolla, was titled by merging *libertad* (Spanish for liberty) and tango. It remains one of Piazzolla's most celebrated compositions and this arrangement by Mark Fish for Quinteto Latino is a favorite in the quintet's repertoire.

Famed Mexican composer Gabriela Ortiz's *Puzzle-Tocas* is an intoxicating swirl of musical fragments, colors and extreme dynamics, constantly overlapping and transforming. Dense, rhythmically-pointed sections dissolve into jazz-like moments before spinning off into further sonic spheres. Today's excerpt of *Puzzle-Tocas* drops into a cool, bassoon-lead moment before careening through multiple pieces of Ortiz's "puzzle" in an uninterrupted ride to the surprising end.

Commissioned by Quinteto Latino, *Mitos* (Myths) was premiered by the quintet in 2021. It depicts four stories from Gabriela Lena Frank's Latin American heritage. Characters that fascinated the composer in her childhood like the *Nguruvila*, (fox-snake), or the mysterious nocturnal bird, *Alicanto*, jump to life with Lena Frank's masterful use of the instruments of the wind quintet.

Quinteto Latino is a San Francisco Bay Area wind quintet with a mission to build community through Latino Classical Music performance and advocacy.

Based in San Francisco, Brass Over Bridges is a brass quintet that understands that music is all about connection. Through a robust series of educational performances, provided at no cost to schools, BoB seeks to bridge the gap and provide arts support and inspiration to students who otherwise might not receive programming of this type. The Musicians are committed to both the high standards of the brass tradition and the forging of new paths within the music. Through commissions and projects that bridge cultural and artistic boundaries, Brass Over Bridges seeks to make music that creates connection and relevance for both listeners and performers.

Bringing together harp, strings, percussion and dance, alongside multi-media use of film, art, staging, lighting, and effects – we invite you to experience this wholly captivating music in a way never before presented!

*"Tango Del Cielo"* features arrangements and contributions by acclaimed composers and performers Jorge Calandrelli, Pablo Ziegler, Daniel Binelli, Jovino Santos Neto, and Jeremy Cohen of Quartet San Francisco.

Anna Maria Mendieta enjoys a busy career as a soloist, orchestral musician, recording artist and teacher. She is the principal harpist with the Sacramento Philharmonic and performs as a soloist and as a member with symphony orchestras and chamber music groups across the country. Her appearances as a soloist feature Joaquin Rodrigo's "*Concierto Serenata*" and "*Concierto de Aranjuez*", as well as special tango arrangements for harp and orchestra. Her national touring concertshow "*Tango del Cielo*" is the focus of a documentary film.

"Mixing it up Vocally: SATB and Continuo" shows audiences how addictive the sounds of period instruments and voices can be! This program features a dramatic, flexible quartet of vocalists representing the soprano, alto, tenor, and baritone sections of PBO's all-star Chorale. Accompanied by a PBO continuo cellist and harpsichordist, the ensemble performs a variety of popular repertoire from the baroque period and beyond, treating the audience to unforgettable tunes and "HIP" (historically informed performance). The program is part of Philharmonia's Education Program, which engages audiences of all ages in actively sharing the broad range of Philharmonia's music through community events, school partnerships, live concerts, and intensive young artist training.

Don't miss the premiere performance of "*Bach in Bengal*," at 2:00 PM, April 23 in the San Francisco Conservatory of Music's Chang Chi Ming Hall! The program will include sitar player and Mosaic America Grant Recipient Arjun Verma's new composition for sitar, tabla, violin, viola, cello, and bass, as well as Verma's arrangement of classical variations on a baroque theme by the late Ali Akbhar Khan. Verma skillfully weaves traditions, themes and practices of diverse cultures into new, intercultural performances. Following the music performances, a panel conversation will engage the audience in exploring the cultural connectedness of Indian and Baroque musical traditions. This free, public event is a collaboration with Mosaic America and Philharmonia, in a Conservatory residency featuring Arjun Verma with musicians from Philharmonia.

Classical Revolution is a global network of musicians revolutionizing the way live classical music is programmed and heard. Founded in San Francisco's Mission district in the fall of 2006, Classical Revolution's goal is to make classical chamber music more relevant in our neighborhoods and communities.

After a successful first year of weekly shows at Revolution Cafe, the organization received invitations to perform at other local venues including Amnesia, Red Poppy Art House, the Legion of Honor, de Young Museum, Yoshi's SF and Herbst Theatre. As interest grew outside of San Francisco, the network of chapters began to develop, with over 40 cities hosting regular gatherings around the US, Canada, Europe, Australia, as well as Indonesia, Argentina, South Korea, and Japan.

Over 1000 musicians have performed at more than 1200 Classical Revolution events in over 125 different venues in the Bay Area alone. Audiences enjoy the accessibility of the venues and the fun laid back approach, as well as the diversity and quality in programming. In San Francisco, Classical Revolution hosts regular events including Chamber Sundays at Arcana, Mission Street; Tuesdays at Gestalt 16th Street; Saturdays at Liberties Bar, Guerrero Street; and first Tuesdays at Casements Bar.

The Mycos Project is a collective of multi-media artists, educators and scientists founded by Kate Stenberg and Irene Sazer. Mycos, short for Mycorrhiza, is the magical symbiotic association between plant roots and fungi. The Mycos Project adopted this name as a metaphor for how all life is dependent on all other life. The Mycos Project's mission is to expand awareness about climate change through the arts, ecological sciences and indigenous wisdom, presenting information and encouraging solutions through the medium of fine arts.

In this project, Sazer and Stenberg have created a 30 minute multimedia work with film and music including artist and educator Kanyon Sayers-Roods whose focus is bridging the gap between Indigenous and contemporary value systems, and Ravinder Sehgal, a SFSU biologist whose research focuses on the ecology of diseases in birds.

Kate Stenberg's violin playing has been described as "stunning... getting under the skin of the music from start to finish." She is a leading interpreter of contemporary chamber music, having premiered over a hundred works by composers worldwide, including works with multimedia and improvisation.

An original member of the Turtle Island String Quartet and founder of the Real Vocal String Quartet, Irene Sazer's deep experience in a vast array of musical styles, and her talent as an improviser, singer, composer, arranger and educator, make her a unique musical voice in the international community.

### A Joyful Noise — Vocalist Tiffany Austin explores the ways we use music to transcend our earthly experience, from ring shouts and spirituals to the works of John Coltrane and Pharaoh Sanders.

Widely hailed as one of the best jazz debut albums of 2015, Tiffany Austin's self-released "*Nothing But Soul*" made quite a splash, including sterling reviews in Downbeat and on NPR's "Fresh Air." Her follow-up album, "*Unbroken*," confirms the Bay Area vocalist's status as one of jazz's elite singers and a formidable songwriter as well.

*"Unbroken"* is both a timeless meditation on African-American culture's extraordinary resilience and an all-too-timely response to the re-energized forces seeking to degrade and deny that legacy.

Rather than separating African-American music into kindred tributaries, Austin plunges into the whole river of sound that's sustained black life in America since before the nation's founding. In many ways, she's contesting what vocalist Gregory Porter has called "musical genocide" with a soul-steeped affirmation that embraces blues and swing, spirituals and R&B, bebop, post-bop, and her own Louisiana Creole heritage.

Marcus Anthony Shelby is a composer, bassist, bandleader, and educator based in San Francisco, California. His work focuses on the history, present, and future of African American lives, social movements and music education.

Shelby is the Artistic Director of Healdsburg Jazz, an artist in residence with the Yerba Buena Gardens Festival, and a past resident artist with the San Francisco Jazz Festival and the Healdsburg Jazz Festival. Shelby has composed several oratorios and suites including "Harriet Tubman," "Beyond the Blues: A Prison Oratorio," "Soul of the Movement: Meditations on Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.," "Black Ball: The Negro Leagues and the Blues," "Green and Blues," and a children's opera "Harriet's Spirit" produced by Opera Parallèle (2018). Shelby also composed the score and performed in Anna Deavere Smith's Off-Broadway Play and HBO feature film "Notes from the Field" (2019).

Shelby is also the voice of Ray Gardener in the 2020 Oscar-Winning Disney Pixar film "SOUL". Shelby has also worked with a range of artists including Angela Y. Davis' "Blues Legacies and Black Feminism" (2019), Joanna Haigood's "Dying While Black and Brown" (2014), Margo Hall's "Bebop Baby" (2013), and "Sonny's Blues" (2008), the Oakland Ballet's "Ella" The SF Girl Choir (2013), The Oakland Youth Chorus (2014), and many other productions over the past 23 years. Shelby has served on the San Francisco Arts Commission since 2013 and has worked with the Equal Justice Society for over 20 years. The Marcus Shelby Orchestra has released 5 CDs—"The Lights Suite," "Port Chicago," "Harriet Tubman," "Soul of the Movement: Meditations on Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.," and "Transitions."

The Aveta Trio, one of the Young Chamber Musicians program's seven teenage ensembles, won the gold medal in the junior division of the 2021 Fischoff Chamber Music Competition. The competition is the largest and longest running of its kind in the nation, and includes a cash prize and an appearance on NPR's "From the Top." The trio impressed judges with excerpts from Beethoven's *Piano Trio in E-flat Major, Op. 70, No. 2*, Dvořák's *Piano Trio in G Minor, Op. 26* and Gaspar Cassadó's *Piano Trio in C Major*. Their coaches include Susan Bates and Jeffrey LaDeur.

Young Chamber Musicians, founded and directed by violist Susan Bates offers advanced chamber music instruction and exciting performance opportunities to string players and pianists ages 14-19. The program immerses students in the chamber music repertoire to develop technical skill, musical imagination, and the art of working with others. Through its collaboration with Music at Kohl Mansion and Mercy High School, Burlingame, YCM has fostered "learning through listening and performing" since 2008.

Sierra Ensemble is an innovative violin, French horn, and piano trio committed to supporting a lively chamber music environment. Performing worldwide and throughout the United States since 1998, Sierra Ensemble's mission seeks to build community and add to the unique violin, horn, and piano trio repertoire via composer commissions, education projects and accessible performances. Sierra Ensemble was the winner of CEC ArtsLink and U.S. Department of State grants for the ensemble's project, the Turkish American Composers Project in 2013.

To help expand the horn trio repertoire, the ensemble has commissioned composers Russell Steinberg, Tolga Özdemir, Richard Aldag, Anthony DeRitis and Andres Carrizo, who joined Sierra Ensemble and Medius Terra Horn Duo at Avaloch (2019). Richard Aldag's *Trio for Violin, Horn, and Piano* was commissioned and premiered by Sierra Ensemble with support through InterMusic SF's 2021 Musical Grant Program. Sierra Ensemble is currently recording the Brahms Horn Trio. Their performance, noted for "...glowing dexterity... a first class blend of sensitive Brahms...," is set be released this summer, 2022.

Fascinated by the feedback loop between social change, technology, and artistic innovation, the San Francisco-based Del Sol Quartet is a leading force in 21st-century chamber music. They believe that live music can, and should, happen anywhere – whether introducing Ben Johnston's microtonal *Americana* at the Library of Congress or in a canyon cave, taking Aeryn Santillan's gun-violence memorial to the streets of the Mission District, or collaborating with Huang Ruo and the anonymous Chinese poets who carved their words into the walls of the Angel Island Immigration Station.

Since 1992, Del Sol has commissioned or premiered thousands of works by composers including Terry Riley, Gabriela Lena Frank, Tania León, Frederic Rzewski, Vijay Iyer, Mason Bates, Michael Harrison, Huang Ruo, Pamela Z, Chinary Ung, Chen Yi, Erberk Eryilmaz, Theresa Wong, Reza Vali, and Kui Dong.

Del Sol's eleventh album "*A Dust in Time*" debuted at #3 on Billboard in October 2021. Called "excavations of beauty from the elemental" (NY Times), this hourlong meditation was released in the form of a coloring book. In the 2021–2022 seasons, Del Sol continues its Joy Project, performing outdoor pop-ups around the Bay Area of music written to inspire joy. They also are producing two large projects: "*The Angel Island Project*," an immigration-themed oratorio by Chinese American composer Huang Ruo, and "*Between Worlds of Sound*," a collaboration with North Indian musicians Alam Khan & Arjun Verma. As part of the Venice Biennale, the quartet are featured artists at the Arts Letter and Numbers Pavilion.

### Orlgianl Latin Jazz for flutes and rhythm section

Multi-instrumentalist, composer, arranger, and educator John Calloway has been a cornerstone of the Bay Area Latin jazz and world music scenes since the 1970s. Adept at flute, piano, and percussion, John has collaborated with local and international jazz and Latin jazz innovators including Israel Cachao Lopez, Max Roach, Omar Sosa and Dizzy Gillespie and in the Bay Area, Pete Escovedo, Jesus Diaz, John Santos, Quique Cruz, Rebeca Mauleon, Marcus Shelby and Wayne Wallace.

As an educator, John has taught jazz, Afro-Cuban music and Latin American music at San Francisco State University, and has frequently traveled to Cuba as program coordinator in conjunction with the National School of the Arts in Havana, Cuba. Providing music education to young people from all backgrounds has been at the center of Calloway's career. He has taught music for 25 years in the San Francisco Unified School District, and is the longtime music director of the Latin Jazz Youth Ensemble of San Francisco (LJYE), a free music program providing music education and performance opportunities to Bay Area youth.

John has led his own ensembles since the 1990s, releasing three CDs, *Diaspora* (2001), *The Code* (2007) and *Asere Ko* (2016) and has performed internationally and at many major jazz festivals, including Stanford, Monterey and the San Jose Jazz Festival.

JAZZphoria is a contemporary octet led by tenor saxophonist/composer Jean Fineberg. The ensemble's all-original repertoire ranges from swing to bebop, funk, New Orleans R&B, blues, salsa and reggae. Comprised of seven women and one man, JAZZphoria features an impressive four-piece horn section and a solid grooving rhythm section, recreating the powerful sound of a jazz orchestra.

Bandleader Jean Fineberg has recorded on more than 50 albums, and her compositions have been performed at the Monterey Jazz Festival, San Jose Jazz Festival, Carnegie Hall, The Grammys and the Kennedy Center. JAZZphoria's musicians have toured and/or recorded with Melba Liston, David Bowie, Laura Nyro, Luther Vandross, Andrea Bocelli, Cornell Dupree and Mo'fone.

Much of the ensemble's personnel draws from the Montclair Women's Big Band, the celebrated Bay Area jazz orchestra of which Fineberg has been assistant director and resident composer since 1997. "In addition to multi-instrumentalists, I wanted a team atmosphere," she says, regarding her strategy. "We have that in the big band, as well as in JAZZphoria. However, we do have a man on drums, so we're not one of those single-gender bands!"

### Itkuja Suite

*Itkuja Suite* (pronounced it-koo-yaw) is an original ethno-music research project knitting jazz, mythopoetic structure, and free improvisation inspired by the oral traditions and healing practices of the lament from Finland and Finno-Ugric culture.

The tradition of song through lament has served as a form of community expression spanning millennia, invoking processes of healing in profound ways. The Finnish word *itkuja* literally means crying, but hidden within this translation embodies deeper undercurrents of meaning. *Itkuja* surpasses the biopic Western acceptance of polar opposites (i.e. happy/sad, good/bad), drawing a more all-encompassing world view of the definition of existence, loss, and change.

Storytelling has a profound effect on Romus' musical endeavors. The first of many experimental musical theatrical presentations began in the late 1990s, creating a series of works inspired by Edgar Allen Poe, Philip K. Dick, and Frank Herbert. After reading multiple versions of the Finnish National Epic, the Kalevala, he discovered that music based on interpretations of his cultural heritage could serve as a path towards a deeper understanding. While on tour, he visited the cultural center in Joensuu, Finland, where he discovered the lament exhibit. This sparked discussions and research gathering with Dr. Heikki Laitinen and co-composer Heikki Koskinen, which blossomed into new musical ideas based on this oral-tradition. He discovered a deep musical structure that existed in the old healing practice of the lament, something he feels is needed even more in these times. These tonal and rhythmic structures present a communal world view which is the spark for the creation of *Itkuja Suite*.

Black London is a new band and collective of Bay Area musicians, artists, and bandleaders, featuring Kev Choice, Mike Blankenship, and Howard Wiley, who push for excellence, preservation, and progression of black music and culture through performance, recordings, and collaboration.

Choice and Wiley met as pre-teenagers at UC Berkeley's Young Musician's Program, and later met Blankenship as he became an in-demand player on the Bay Area music scene. They built a special bond in 2007 as members of Ms. Lauryn Hill's band that Choice was musical director of and each played an integral role in the band as they toured over 15 countries in a year's time span. They have been collaborating on projects and performances ever since. All three have established themselves as bandleaders in the Bay Area; Blankenship with "Spooky Fox", Wiley with "Extra Nappy," and Choice with "Kev Choice Ensemble." Each has also released individual projects that have solidified their careers; Choice with four albums, including the acclaimed "*Oakland Riviera*" and his instrumental project "88 Steps To Eternity," Blankenship with his "*Living For The Future*," and Wiley with "*The Angola Project*."
